A brochure issued in 1922 by Cunard, Anchor Line and Anchor-Donaldson Line explaining how friends and relatives can get out of Russia and Ukraine legally. "The heavy demand for correct information regarding the situation in Russia today, and the facilities existing for bringing people out of Russia to their relatives in this country, has prompted the Cunard and Anchor Lines to issue this folder, as they feel that it will answer the questions in the minds of many persons in the United States and Canada who have families and relatives in Soviet Russia. Much inaccurate and misleading information has been spread regarding Russia, and the arrangements for travel from that country. The actual situation there is that there are now many routes open to passengers coming from Russia, and that the Soviet Government is not discouraging the emigration of such classes of passengers as are eligible for admission to this country... The conditions of travel on the Russian railroads has improved considerably during the last few months... 



3. [Apothecary] 1863 Boston, Massachusetts Apothecary Billhead. A billhead dated October 24, 1863 from Smith & Melvin, "Apothecaries. Originators of the Liquid Extract of Opium, and the Fluid Extract of Valerian". An advertisement in the Boston Medical and Surgical Journal in 1852 declares- "The want of a uniform preparation of Opium which should take the place of Laudanum, as usually prepared, has been long felt by physicians and others. Having been daily reminded, in dispensing medicines, of the uncertain strength of several preparations of this important drug, [Smith & Melvin] were led to substitute for these a refined chemical solution, prepared by them, of all the active medical constituents of Opium. Its strength is precisely that of the original Laudanum, and this standard, accurately fixed, will be maintained in all parcels bearing our signature". Single sheet. 7.5"x6.25". 

4. [Apothecary] 1868 San Francisco Apothecary Prescription. A handwritten prescription dated November 17, 1868, on the billhead of C.F. Richards & Co., "Druggists, Chemists and Apothecaries". Just a few weeks before this prescription was written the store was shaken by an earthquake; the San Francisco Morning Call of October 22, 1868, reported- "Yesterday morning San Francisco was visited by the most severe earthquake the city ever experienced. The great shock commenced at 7:53 A.M. and continued nearly one minute, being the longest ever known in this region. Men, women, and children rushed into the streets—some in a state of semi-nudity —and all in the wildest state of excitement. Many acted as if they though the Day of Judgment had come. For a time the excitement was intense, and the panic was general. ...in the building occupied by the drug store of C.F. Richards & Co., the shock was felt in full force. The bottles and cases were hurled upon the floor in wild confusion, many of them being broken and their contents poured out. This firm will sustain a loss of about \$500." On June 23, 1894, the same paper reported the druggist's bankruptcy- "A big failure was recorded in a petition in voluntary insolvency presented by Clayton F. Richards, manager of the insolvent Richards Drug Company. The debtor owes altogether \$73,661.23, of which \$10,803.57 is the amount of his personal liabilities, while he owes the balance of \$62,860.66 under his liability as a stockholder in the Richards Drug Company, which is in the hands of an assignee, in the last-mentioned account appears an item of \$17,372.97 due by the company on a promissory note to the Crocker-Woolworth Bank. Richards' sole assets consist of \$50 worth of wearing apparel, 800 shares of stock in the Richards' Drug Company, being estimated as having no value whatever. #### 7. [Art -Frauds] 1891 Circular Letter from the Tanqueray Portrait Society.

Brooklyn, New York, 1891. A circular letter dated October 13, 1891, introducing the Society's portrait-making skills and inviting the recipient to send a photograph for a high-quality crayon portrait by a Society artist, a \$25 value, free of charge. In return they hope you will recommend the Society's portrait-making skills to your friends, and display your portrait in your home. On the reverse side are a number of testimonials. An internet search brings up a few interesting facts about this firm- on August 29, 1893 they were banned from using the U.S. mails, and after that they apparently moved overseas, as a note in the June 29, 1902 Perth Sunday Times notes that the Times, and a number of readers, have received the offer of a free portrait from the Tanqueray Portrait Society in Paris. A few weeks after sending their photograph, one correspondent received a letter announcing that the portrait was complete, and so beautiful that it would look especially nice framed- and the Society has a catalog of frames for sale they would like to send. 9. [Birds] 1881 Massachusetts Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Bird's Egg **Protection Poster.** Boston, 1881. This represents a very early attempt to protect birds and their eggs- the Audubon Society, the longtime champion of birds and their nests, would not be founded until 1886, and in the 1880s there were no Federal laws and only a smattering of state laws, protecting songbirds and their nests and eggs. "Protect the Birds and their Eggs! The Massachusetts Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals asks the attention of all good citizens to the law of the Commonwealth for the protection of small birds and their nests, and it invites their co-operation in the enforcement of the same. The penalty is ten dollars for killing each bird, and for willfully destroying, disturbing or taking their nests or eggs the same sum... Parents and teachers are especially entreated to instruct their children not to bear any part in the killing and robbery of the innocent birds. Remember their service to man in protecting his crops. As Longfellow has said: 'They are the winged wardens of your farms, - Who from the cornfield, drive the insidious foes, - And from your harvest keep a hundred harms'." The MSPCA was founded in 1868, the second-oldest humane society in the United States, and among those on its first board of directors were John Quincy Adams II and Ralph Waldo Emerson. 13. [Dead Artists] Price, Lucien. Immortal Youth. A Study in the Will to Create. A Memoir of Fred. A. Demmler. Boston; McGrath-Sherrill Press: 1919. A rather polychromatic remembrance of a Pittsburgh-based portrait painter who was killed in the last moments of World War One. Fred "Fritz" Demmler studied under Tarbell and Benson at the Boston Museum of Fine Arts School before returning to his native Pittsburgh and embarking on a successful and promising career as a portraitist. American involvement in the First World War and the draft intervened, and Demmler shipped to France as part of a machine gun unit, attaining the rank of sergeant in a very short time before being killed during an attack just a week before the Armistice. The author, Junius Lucien Price (1883-1964), became friends with Demmler while Demmler was at the Museum of Fine Arts School, and the two remained close until Demmler's death. Price was a popular author of non fiction books as well as a staff writer for The Boston Evening Transcript, the Boston Globe, and The Atlantic Monthly. This book has the ownership signature of artist Russell Cheney. Cheney (1881-1945) was a New England-born painter who studied at the Art Students League of New York and served as its president for two years. His work is held in many private and public collections including the Boston Museum of Fine Arts and the San Francisco Museum of Art. He was also a member of the Connecticut Academy of Arts and Sciences, the San Francisco Art Society, and the Colorado Springs Fine Arts Center. Hardcover. 6"x9", 53 ages, tipped-in color plate. 

14. [Dead Generals] In Memoriam - K. of K. "Reproduced from the New York Times, June 7th, 1916". A memorial broadside for Lord Kitchener, "Kitchener of Karthoum", of "Your country needs you!" immortality, printed just after he was drowned when his armoured cruiser struck a mine and sank in World War I. Field Marshal Horatio Herbert Kitchener, 1st Earl Kitchener (1850-1916), was an Irish-born British Field Marshal who won fame for his imperial campaigns and later played a central role in the early part of the First World War. "Kitchener won fame in 1898 for winning the Battle of Omdurman and securing control of the Sudan, after which he was given the title "Lord Kitchener of Khartoum". In 1914, at the start of the First World War, Lord Kitchener became Secretary of State for War, a Cabinet Minister. One of the few to foresee a long war, he organised the largest volunteer army that Britain, and indeed the world, had seen and a significant expansion of materials production to fight Germany on the Western Front. His commanding image, appearing on recruiting posters demanding "Your country needs you!", remains recognised and parodied in popular culture to this day. Lord Kitchener sailed from Scapa Flow on 5 June 1916 aboard the armoured cruiser HMS Hampshire for a diplomatic mission to Russia. Sailing alone in heavy seas, Hampshire was approximately 1.5 miles off the mainland of Orkney at 19:40 when an explosion occurred and she heeled to starboard. About 15 minutes after the explosion, Hampshire sank by the bows. Of over 600 personnel aboard, only 12 men on two Carley floats managed to reach the shore; Kitchener and his staff were lost. His body was never found. The survivors who caught sight of him in those last moments testified to his outward calm and resolution." Broadside, on light card stock. 6.5"x9". Audot's manual, first published ca. 1813, went through several editions and offered the serious gardener complete nuts and bolts advice and diagrams for such advanced operations as cross-pollination, grafting and air-layering and espaliering trees. The plates include details of the leaves, flowers and sexual systems of various types of fruits and flowers, as well as examples of tools, shovels, rakes, scythes, pruners, barrows, and also several plans for greenhouses and cold frames. "Gardens have always been intriguing artistic subjects, mainly because of their mythological and Biblical symbolism. The Dutch had no formal gardens of their own until the late 17th century, and early Netherlandish artists used Italian models, and imagination, to portray them. Thus, unlike the realistic interiors of the same period, most of the garden settings are pure fantasy. The exhibition of paintings, drawings, prints, and rare books for which this is the catalog was not exactly a blockbuster; budget restrictions limited borrowing to the East Coast, and many of the artists are obscure. Nevertheless, the show had substance, focusing more on iconography than artistic merit, and Hellerstedt discusses aspects of Netherlandish art not previously examined in depth. 



Richard Gude had been a governor of the Chartered Gas Company from 1823 to 1832, but appears to have broken with them in favor of their competitors, of whom the Equitable Gas Company and London Gas Company are prominently mentioned here. England's National Archives, which holds the Chartered Gas Company's papers, notes- "The Chartered Gas Light and Coke Company was the first gas undertaking in the world, concerned chiefly, until the 1880s, with the production of gas for lighting purposes. It was incorporated by Act of Parliament in 1810 and the charter was granted by the Prince Regent in 1812. The origins of the gas industry lay with the discovery of coal gas in the early 18th century. Gas lighting for

homes, buildings and streets was pioneered by William Murdoch, a Scottish engineer, who with his pupil Samuel Clegg of Manchester and John Malam of Hull, designed and built gas works for mills and factories from 1800 to enable them to be lit. They worked with entrepreneurs such as F A Winsor to secure financial backing. Winsor's ideal was to have a central gas works making gas for illumination in every town and city in the country. Samuel Clegg joined the Chartered Company and constructed the first operational public gas works in Peter Street, Horseferry Road, Westminster, which began producing coal gas in September 1813. Developments at Westminster were followed by the rapid expansion of gas works and their Companies across London and other cities and large towns in England and Wales. By 1830, there were 200 gas Companies, by 1850 there 800 gas Companies, 13 of which were in London, and by 1860 there were nearly 1,000 gas Companies." Pamphlet. 5.5"x9". 6 pages. 

Charlton Bristow Perkins, in his "Travels from the Grandeurs of the West to Mysteries of the East" (San Francisco, 1909), notes-"Nikko was chosen as the site for the most splendid temples of Japan, and you will see there the finest creations of Japanese art in combination with the loveliest examples of Japanese scenery." An over-the-counter remedy of no known efficacy, it was avoided by traditional druggists but flew off the shelves of corner markets and dry goods stores, the target of consumers who appreciated the palliative effects of its 18% alcohol content. 

The newly-invented Sostenente solves all that.


An unpublished Mott family history reveals-"Isaac Henry Robert Mott was born in Birmingham in 1790. He initially trained as a physician, though, after he married Fanny Rackstrow in 1813, he developed a very different career. He established himself not only as a pianoforte maker but as a player and composer of some talent. There is also a record of I.H.R. Mott's "circulating library" in Brighton, which may have lent sheet music to his clients. He was an entrepreneur and relentless self-promoter. He took out a patent for a new type of pianoforte in 1817, which he labelled the "sostinente" pianoforte. He took out other patents in the 1840s and 1850s for other initiatives in piano manufacturing. He also published a guide to playing the pianoforte in the 1820s, floridly titled "I.H.R. Mott's Advice and Instructions for playing the Piano Forte with Expression and brilliant Execution". After receiving royal patronage in Brighton, he relocated to London in partnership with his cousin, Julius Caesar Mott. The partnership was dissolved in 1824. Julius went to Leicestershire where he developed a successful wine merchant's business. Isaac remained in London, developing and expanding the business. His expansion was too great and he was declared bankrupt in 1840. Despite this, he was able to continue in business, possibly with the help of his father-in-law, a broker and no doubt wealthy. He continued promoting the piano company, displaying one of his pianos at the Paris Exhibition in 1851. Isaac died suddenly of a heart attack while in France in 1855. He was 65." 

The pottery used local clays from the Island. In 1930, Wrigley brought artisans to the Island to design decorative and functional pottery products including souvenirs, vases, bookends and figurines.. Red clays found on the Island were used for pottery until 1931. Glazes were made with local minerals mined on the Island. The company sold its ware as Catalina Pottery and



Catalina Tile. The pottery opened free standing stores to sell their wares in Avalon, Santa Catalina Island, Hollywood, Olvera Street in Los Angeles, and in the Arizona Biltmore Hotel, Phoenix. In 1937, Catalina Clay Products, including all equipment, stock, molds, and trademarks, were sold to Gladding, McBean & Co. All molds and equipment were moved to Gladding, McBean & Co.'s Glendale plant in Los Angeles. 

34. [Rosetta Stone] Hale, Charles, S. Huntington-Jones & Henry Morton. Report of the Committee appointed by the Philomathean Society of the University of Pennsylvania to translate the inscription on the Rosetta Stone. Philadelphia; printed by L.N. Rosenthal: 1859. 2nd edition.

Certainly one of the most remarkable and striking examples of American 19th century color lithography and Victorian book illustration. It was based upon a translation of a plaster cast of the Rosetta Stone which had been given to the Society, but this seems to have been merely an excuse, seized upon by Henry Morton as the starting point for a Victorian extravaganza of Egyptian and Floral-motif based, pseudo-Medieval decorative frenzy. There are five separate color-lithographed plates of Egyptian scenes and a full-page lithographed illustration of the stone itself, but this is merely the start. The illusion of a Medieval illuminated manuscript is first suggested by the use of



script for the text, a decorative conceit made possible by the use of lithographic stones to print the entire book (it is said more than 400 separate stones were used). Seventy of the text pages are bordered with decorative elements, many with decorative initial letters, and floral and Egyptian designs. The section-header pages are also elaborately decorated.

The use of many different illustrative styles, from extremely stylized to extremely realistic, is a pure Victorian imagery which keeps the production firmly footed in the nineteenth century. Some of the most interesting decorations are the Egyptian-based ones, featuring both decorative motifs and entire scenes twining around the text. Originally produced in an edition of some 400 copies, the entire initial printing is said to have been exhausted within a few days. The second printing was done from a different set of stones and is, therefor, not an exact reproduction of the first. As the first included a distinctly bizarre pagination this is not all bad news; the pagination here is better, but still has strange irregularities. There was, of course, a serious side to the production, with lithographed reproductions of the Stone's inscriptions and hieroglyphs, along with translations, and a history of the Stone and its discovery. The entire production took three years and becomes all the more remarkable when we consider that the three were students at the time, the oldest of them only 22. An interesting testament to the skill and ingenuity of the designer Henry Morton and the lithographer, L.N. Rosenthal.

A broadside promoting "B.T., Babbitt's Best Soap - Soap Powder and Pure Potash - The Staple and Standard for purity and Quality". The back side has Babbitt's Soap word game. Wikipedia notes- "Benjamin Talbot Babbitt (1809–1889) was a self-made American businessman. Babbitt manufactured "saleratus" (or sodium bicarbonate, commonly called baking soda). He packaged and marketed his product so well that he quickly controlled most of the sodium bicarbonate market. He started producing a baking powder, a soap powder and several varieties of soap, all of them also successfully marketed well, and very popular. In 1851, he became the first to manufacture and market soap in individual bars, which he packaged attractively and added a claim of quality. He took the ordinary and proved it could be turned into a marketable product. Babbitt became known as a genius in the art of advertising...becoming a household name throughout the U.S. His soap was one of the first nationally advertised products. The soap was sold from brightly painted street cars with musicians, which helped lead the phrase "get on the



bandwagon." Babbitt was the first manufacturer to offer tours of his factories and one of the first to give away free samples. 

The basic text and illustrations are hand-lettered and drawn, but this is not, as it first appears, a manuscript (though there are manuscript additions in the form of a pencil drawing and pasted-in chromolithographic pictures), but some sort of mechanical reproduction, probably printed in a quantity as small as nine copies, one for each member of 'The Tribe'. Quite odd, unusual and charmingly Victorian.

OCLC lists a single example of the title, catalogued as "archival material", at Brown University. That copy is inscribed to Hattie B.

Clough, who is ascribed authorship, though that seems incorrect. This copy is inscribed to Maria W. Baylies, "from the author". Maria W. Baylies is listed as a member of the Old County Historical Society of Taunton, Massachusetts in 1899, and also listed as a member of the




A pair of letters poignantly illustrating that the course of True Love running into a brick wall is not anything new-

"December 26, 1878 - Mr. Butler, I was very much surprised at the elegant present you sent me yesterday, particularly when I told you such a short time ago that I did not receive costly presents from my gentlemen



friends; it is a rule I have always made, and mother before me. I did question the receiving of it for some time, but did not wish to hurt your feelings by returning it, particularly at this happy season, and I hope we shall always remain friends; therefor will accept it as a token of your friendship, but hope you will never repeat it. I (illegible) the (illegible) you sent, but do not understand what you meant by them, or how they apply to friendship. Do not think that I do not appreciate and value the gift, as well as the kind thought that prompted it. Thanking you for your kindness, and hoping you will understand my feelings on the subject, with many wishes for a happy New Year, I am ever your friend, Annie P. Newbold".

And then- "Mr. Butler, I think you will have to excuse me from going to that meeting, thursday, as I have no interest in the subject to be discussed, I think it would prove myself guilty of the charge you made against me of 'indifference'. Hoping the next time you want time to go anywhere with you I will be able to go, and will try and not by 'indifferent' to any thing I see. (illegible) your friend, Annie P. Newbold". 2 letters. 


40. [Weathervanes] Celebrated Copper Weathervanes, Hand Made From Our Original Old Molds.


The September 12, 1964 'Talk of the Town' column in The New Yorker reported on Charles C. Kessler, "age 81, who describes himself as a Relic of the Golden Age of Weathervanes. Once he was a steeplejack, but he has spent most of his working life with E.G. Washburne & Co., a firm that has made weathervanes of hand-hammered copper and gold leaf for 111 years. In 1908 the firm moved to 207 Fulton St. & were doing all the vanes for the big estates going up. Mr. Kessler said as long as he's alive Washburne will make its vanes by hand. In 1956,

Mr. Kessler turned the Washburne tools and dies over to a younger man, who moved them to a factory up in Danvers, Mass. The vanes are fabricated there, then shipped to a factory in Brooklyn for gilding with 23-carat gold leaf.
